



Understanding the Torah's Structure

Parshat BaHa'alotcha is divided in half with two verses set off and encompassed by an inverted Nun. The verses are used in our liturgy to announce the opening and closing of the ark - "וידעי בנסוע הארץ" and "ובנחה יאמר" respectively. By so dividing the Parsha, these verses divide the entire Sefer BaMidbar into two units: - the laws of the camp of Israel and preparations for the journey from Mt. Sinai to Eretz Yisrael before these two verses, and the actual story of the journey thereafter. Now Sefer Sh'mot is also divided into two units:- the story of slavery, exodus and Ma'amad Har Sinai (the Simaitic revelation) constitutes the first half and the laws of the Mishkan and her constitution form the latter section. Between Sh'mot and Ba Midbar we have Sefer Va Yikrah in which God's revelation is delivered in the Tent of Meeting of the Mishkan. We can thus organize the central three books of the Torah into the following pattern. A:- Journey to Mt. Sinai, B:- the erection of the Mishkan and her laws. C:- God teaching the holiness laws in the tent of meeting. Here C becomes the centerpiece of the Torah. It is followed by B2:- the erection of Israeli's camp around the Mishkan and A2 the journey away from Mt. Sinai to the border of the promised land. We can structure the pattern as A B C B2 A2. This pattern then tells us that the God-man relationship in Israel reaches her climax when God and Israel can commune - not at a mountain top outside of Eretz Yisrael, but rather at a central shrine at the center point of the camp of Israel. This then, will be the model for the conquest and settlement of Eretz Yisrael. Here, Israel's camp will extend through the land and will find its central point at the Beit Ha Mikdash.

Now the camp of Israel itself forms two concentric circles around a central shrine, The Mishkan stands at the center, and the Kohanim and Levites camp around the Mishkan. Around them, there are three tribes each to the North, East, South, and West of the inner circle of Kohanim and Levites.

There is an unmistakable martial pattern to the camp of Israel. A census is taken in advance in which the males 20 years and up are counted and organized in troop formation - כל יוצא צבא בישראל - all who march to battle in Israel. However, this martial structure can serve in other non-military ways as well. The Ramban suggests that this formation can also serve to form a great assembly for self-governance.

The nineteenth century commentator Rav Ya'acov Mecklenberg suggests a very different purpose. Rav Mecklenberg suggests an etymological connection between צבא - battle formation and the Hebrew term צבי which means beautiful. According to Mecklenberg the formation of the camp was designed to demonstrate the most beautiful feature of the life of Israel at that time. שלא נמצא בהם פסול משפחה - Nothing marred the beauty of the life of the Jewish family. Ultimately, it is the Jewish family built upon marital fidelity and purposeful parenting which was to serve as the organizing principle for Jewish life, and the focus of God's presence in Israel.

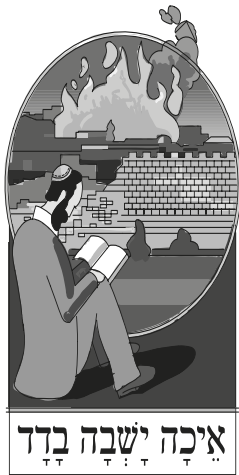

Bein Ha'm'tsarim

The three weeks between the Fast of Tamuz and Tisha B'Av is the most mournful period of the Jewish calendar. The Talmud tells us of five tragic events which occurred on the 17th day of Tamuz: (1) The first set of Ten Commandments was broken. (2) The sacrifices were discontinued. (3) The walls of Jerusalem were breached by the conquering Romans. (4) Apostomus, the tyrant, burned the Torah in order to uproot Judaism from memory, and (5) set up an idol in the Temple.

The Talmud then records 5 tragic events that occurred on Tisha B'Av: (1) The decree was issued in the desert that Israel would have to wait 40 years before entering the land. (2) The First Temple was destroyed. (3) The Second Temple was destroyed. (4) Betar was captured. (5) Jerusalem was ploughed over by the Romans.

We also mourn the tragedy of exile and all the destruction of Jewish history. This is reflected in Kinot for the massacres of the period of the crusades, and for the period of the Cossack pogroms of 1648-49. In our shul, we also include a Kinah for the Kedoshim of the Shoah.

Observances

The fast of Tamuz will occur on Sunday, July 20 is marked by fasting from dawn until the appearance of the stars, as well as by the recitation of Selichot. Throughout the three weeks, marriages are forbidden and public celebration curbed. Throughout the first nine days of the month of Av we refrain from eating meat and drinking wine (except for Shabbat) and refrain from pleasurable activities such as swimming.

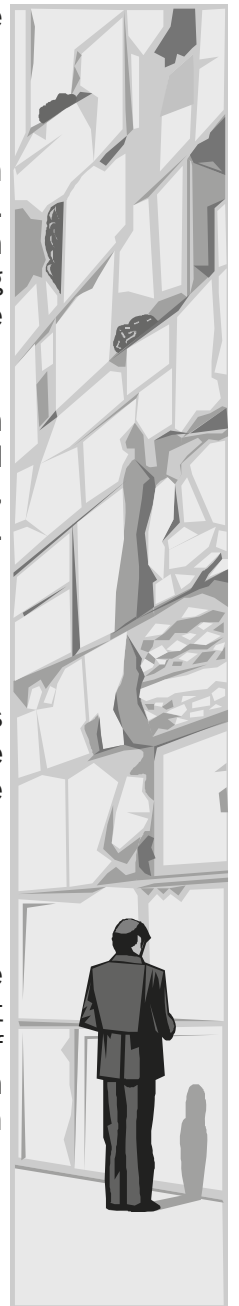
On Tisha B'Av we sit on low benches until noon. We wear our Talit and Tefillin during Mincha service and not during Shacharit when the mourning is still intense. We refrain on Tisha B'Av from eating and drinking, washing for pleasure, anointing with oil and cosmetics, wearing leather shoes, and conjugal relations. Even the study of Torah must be limited to mournful themes.

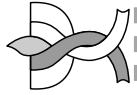
Seudah Mafseket

Because Erev Tisha B'Av occurs on Shabbat, there are no special rules concerning the Seudah Mafseket or last meal before the fast. The Halacha here permits "even meat and wine." Nonetheless, the last meal must end before sundown of that Shabbat day.

Tu B'Av

The fifteenth day of Av is a day of joy coming just six days after the fast. While many reasons are listed in the Talmud for this holiday, perhaps the most compelling is this: on the 15th of Av the Jews were permitted to bury the dead of Betar after its destruction six days earlier. In effect, we rejoice because we can bring closure to the mourning of Tisha B'Av. This year Tu B'Av will occur on Sunday, August 10th.
